For the first time in three years, we received exam results for our Level 3 (A-Level, etc.) and Level 2 (GCSE, etc.) students. This means that students over the last few years have been given a better quality of education and worked harder than they ever have before and proved, if proof were needed, that the TCOLC Community has the ability to do great things. We were one of the best performing schools not just in the city but across the country with a number of subjects being in the top 10% in the country. In the last 2 weeks of the year all year 10's have had the opportunity to learn CPR training courtesy of volunteer medical professionals from 'Heartwize' and Year 9 have been given basic First aid training from 'First-Aid Friends'.



Year 9 had some big decisions to make this year for their GCSE subjects. In PSHE, we spent two terms exploring Unifrog, our careers platform, with our students. We successfully logged on another cohort of 269 Unifrog users to start building their profiles ahead of college and university applications.

Unifrog supported our Year 11s making year in their applications for A-levels, T-levels apprenticeships meaning and another 299 students successful submitted applications for their next steps in education. We are proud to work alongside the careers team to ensure we gave our students the best possible support.

At the beginning of this year, we gained accreditation as a Rainbow Flag school based upon all of our hard work towards promoting diversity, equity and inclusion for all of our students including those of the LGBTQ+ community. This work has continued to develop this academic year in PSHE through development of the curriculum and throughout the pastoral programme.

### **Trips**

This year saw over 54 Educational visits leave the college gates help students undertake real-world experiences that cannot be taught in a classrooms, opening their minds to different cultures and strengthening their knowledge of the world around them.

Trips destinations included the National Space Centre, the London Science museums, theatres and the Stock Exchange, Kenilworth Castle, Hunstanton Beach, Leicester Ice Skating, Auschwitz concentration camp (Poland), Leicester Theatres, Manchester Etihad Stadium, LGBT+ Youth Summit in Manchester, Oxford and Cambridge Universities, Yes You Can Project, London Theatre, Maths and literacy competitions, Church and Mosque visits.

#### **Bronze DofE Off to a Successful Start**

The year has seen the launch of The Duke of Edinburgh's (DofE) Award at TCOLC. The award is the world's leading achievement award for young people, and is highly regarded by Universities, Colleges and Employers. It encourages young people to develop independence, commitment, leadership and teamwork through being involved in a personalised programme of activities.

Those who undertook their Bronze award have spent 6 months developing new skills, buildings their physical fitness and working within the local community. Students have learned German, karate, chess, cooking, first aid, sewing, football, boxing, painting whilst helping at Mosques, community groups, reading clubs, charity shops and supported Park Run and cared elderly neighbours to name just a few of the activities undertook.

The final, and possibly biggest test for the 35 students, was completing the two-day expedition section trekking 17 miles across the Leicestershire countryside. The expedition truly tested the students Character and they had to draw on their resilience and determination to achieve their Bronze award.

This opportunity will be open to Year 8 from September.





### **Business Outside the Classroom**

On Wednesday 8 February 2023, students from the Business Department attended the London Stock Exchange where they were fortunate to receive an insight into a typical working day and hear about career journeys of members of LSEG as well as learn how to stand out as a candidate looking to enter the finance industry. Students also visited the famous Tower of London and saw a number of famous buildings such as the Bank of England and St Pauls Cathedral while on the trip! The trip was very successful and all students represented TCOLC positively throughout the day!










### **History Outside the Classroom**

At the end of June, all the Year 10 History students visited Kenilworth Castle in Warwickshire. The visit was to support their GCSE unit on Norman England, but the castle also has specific links to Leicester: it was the home of Simon de Montfort, who is of course commemorated in various ways throughout the city; but also of Robert Dudley, Earl of Leicester during Elizabeth I's reign, who extensively re-built the castle when the queen paid a visit in 1575.

The students were able to see the different stages of building at Kenilworth – the early Norman keep (12th-13th centuries), the first 'palace' buildings from the late 14th century, and the improvements made by Dudley in the 16th century. They also embarked on an invigorating country walk around the castle grounds, where the grazing cattle proved of surprising interest, as did an unexpected encounter with some alpacas!









#### Science Outside the Classroom

On Wednesday June 21st, a group of 75 Year 8 students visited The Natural History Museum and the Science Museum in London. After a long coach trip, the students had a wonderful, educational day exploring the museums. The day was filled with curiosity and wonder as the students delved into the realms of history, science and discovery.

On entering the Hintze Hall in the Natural History Museum, the students marvelled at the giant blue whale suspended from the ceiling. The students explored the extensive collection of fossils, learning about the evolution of life on Earth.

In the afternoon, we visited the Science Museum, where interactive displays and cutting-edge technology were the student focus. In particular, there was a great deal of interest in the areas dedicated to medicine and that of the world of space. The students found inspiration from launching rockets and artificial intelligence, which has ignited their curiosity and sparked a newfound interest for science and history.
