Parmpreet: What does the dog like to do?


Miss Patel: Ella is obsessed with balls, she is an excellent catcher.



In 1974, architect Erno Rubik sought to illustrate three-dimensional movement to his students, leading to the creation of the "buvos kocka" or magic cube. Renamed the Rubik's Cube, it soared to become the world's most popular puzzle toy, with over 350 million units sold by 2018. This cube, constructed from wood, paper, rubber bands, glue, and paper clips, not only inspired countless artworks and films but also gave rise to speedcubing, a competitive sport where teenagers aim to solve it in record time.
