

From making history in 2016 and beating the odds by becoming the best team in the Premier League and winning the FA Cup Final in 2021. It is safe to say that Leicester have their 15 minutes of fame however, sadly the once the darlings of English football, have suffered the terrible fate of relegation. Just, what went wrong? Did we let the best guys go? Did we sack one too many managers? Did we leave it too late? Why did Leicester City find themselves facing the dreaded drop?

Several factors contributed to their unfortunate fate. Firstly, injuries to key players struck at the heart of the team's performance. The absence of influential figures such as Jamie Vardy and James Maddison severely weakened their attacking power. The Foxes leaked goals at an alarming rate, they failed to consistently fill the defensive gaps. These issues and individual errors cost them crucial points throughout the campaign.

Despite showcasing flashes of brilliance, they failed to sustain their form over the course of the season. They were unable to secure vital victories against lower-ranked teams which exposed their vulnerability and allowed relegation rivals to gain ground.

The distractions were not just on the field, but off the field too. Speculation surrounding key plays, uncertainty around managerial staff and internal conflicts within the team created an atmosphere that did not win. These distractions clearly disrupted the focus of the team and led to such losses (16/26!)

As the final whistle blew on their demotion, Leicester City were left to reflect on a season marred by misfortune, missed opportunities, and a failure to address crucial weaknesses. The Foxes must now regroup, reevaluate, and rebuild with a renewed determination to secure promotion back to the Premier League and rekindle the glory days that once shone upon their beloved King Power Stadium.

CLIMATE CHARGE AND IT'S CHALLENGES

Climate change is the long-term shift in weather patterns and temperatures, which can have detrimental effects, from wildfires to coastal erosion.

During recent years, the effects of climate change are being felt worldwide. The recent wildfires in Canada, have a link to climate change, and are on track to become the new normal if these patterns continue, and coral bleaching in the Great Barrier Reef has become a recurring incident, and it's unsure if it will be able to recover in future incidents. In England, from 2010 to 2018, there has been an extra 16,000 admissions due to warmer than average days.

There is a government plan to try and limit the temperature increase to 1.5 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels, and a net zero target of emissions by 2050. But what is actually being done to ensure this goal is being reached? government is reducing coal usage, and turning to other more renewable sources, especially wind power. This has led to significant reductions in greenhouse gases.

There are also 5 year carbon budgets, that provide a cap on the amount of CO2 that can be produced, to ensure that targets are met. The 2008–2012 and 2013–2017 carbon budgets have both been met, and according to last update we were on track to meet the goals for 2018–2022, 2023–2027, and 2028–2032.

However, more does need to be done, as the UK is still investing in projects that use fossil fuel all over the world, meaning they are still contributing to emissions. Also, we are not on track to meet the carbon budget for 2033-2037, and are currently projected to have a -32 performance against the carbon budgets.

Whilst the focus is mainly on the UK, more can be done by other countries to reduce the overall emissions, from turning to more renewable sources of energy, to encouraging and funding more sustainable practices for its citizens, as in the end, everyone should attempt to do their part, and look at the bigger picture.

CBDC stands for Central Bank Digital Currency. It refers to a digital form of a country's official currency issued and regulated by the central bank. In the UK, it is known as the digital pound, known commonly as 'digital sterling' or 'Britcoin'. It is supposedly the new currency which His Majesty's Revenue and Customs (HMRC) and the Bank of England want to introduce in lieu of the current pound (cash would still remain current, but it is heavily implies that the relevant authorities eventually want to replace cash.)

This move is heavily criticised, but not a lot of action has been taken. There are many downsides to a cashless society however for the CBDC, there will be a limit on

how many digital pounds you may possess. According to Reuters, the government is considering a 20,000 digital pound limit. Also, there is a maximum of one account per person. Rumours have been circulating that the government can even see what you purchase! Of course, the relevant authorities imply they will comply with GDPR and the Data Protection Act, they say they will not and cannot restrict what and how you spend your money.

My opinion of this is that this is ludicrous. How can a government even be allowed to do such a thing? For me, this is just baby steps in restricting our freedom, and if such legislation is passed, more restrictions shall follow which will make us all minions of the government. I strongly urge everyone to read what they get themselves in for and don't believe everything you read or hear!



Suella Braverman and Priti Patel are two Indian-origin women who have held the position of UK Home Secretary. They are both members of the Conservative Party and have been vocal supporters of Brexit. However, they have also differed on some key issues, especially on migration policy with India.

Braverman, who succeeded Patel as Home Secretary in September 2022, has been more restrictive and hardline on immigration than her predecessor. She has announced plans to scrap some of Patel's flagship asylum rules, such as the New Plan for Immigration, which aimed to deter people from making dangerous journeys to the UK and prioritise those who enter through legal routes. Braverman said her new bill, the Nationality and Borders Bill, is "considerably stronger" and would deport anyone who doesn't enter the UK through government-sanctioned routes or who has passed through a "safe" country before arriving here.

Braverman has also expressed "reservations" about Britain's trade deal with India, which was signed by Patel in May 2022, because it could increase immigration to the UK. She said Indian migrants make up the largest number of visa overstayers in the UK and criticised the deal for not working well to return them to India. She also blamed the recent clashes in Leicester, which have a large Hindu population, on uncontrolled migration and failures to integrate.

Patel, on the other hand, has been more open and cooperative on migration policy with India. She signed a landmark deal with India in May 2022, which aimed to facilitate the legal flow of students and professionals between the two countries, while also cracking down on illegal migration and human trafficking. She said the deal would strengthen the "living bridge" between the UK and India and create new opportunities for young people. She also praised India's role in fighting the Covid-19 pandemic and supplying vaccines to the world. Patel and Braverman have also faced similar challenges and criticisms in their roles as Home Secretary. They have both been accused of being too harsh and inhumane on asylum seekers and refugees, violating human rights and international law, and creating a hostile environment for migrants. They have also both been targets of racism, sexism and snobbery from their opponents, who have questioned their competence, loyalty and authenticity. They have both defended themselves by saying they are proud of their heritage and their values, and that they are serving the best interests of the British people.


