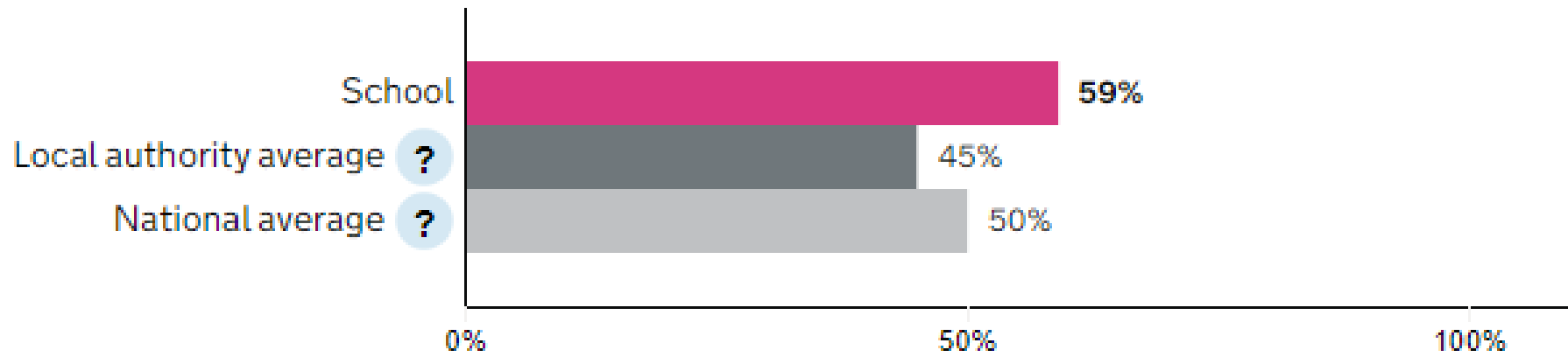

Percentage achieving grade 5 or above in English & maths

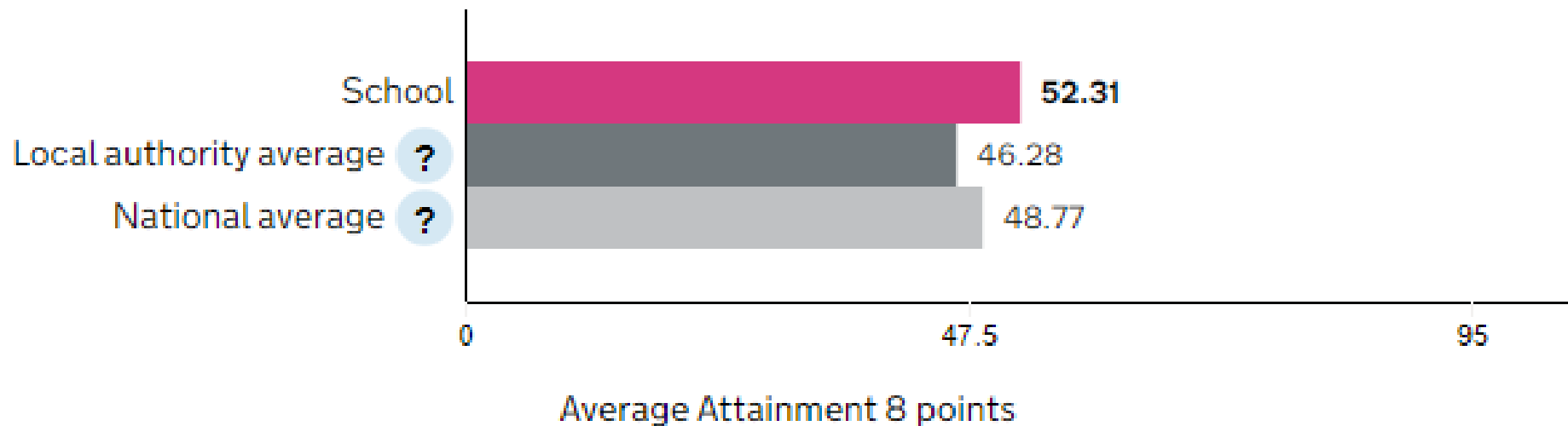

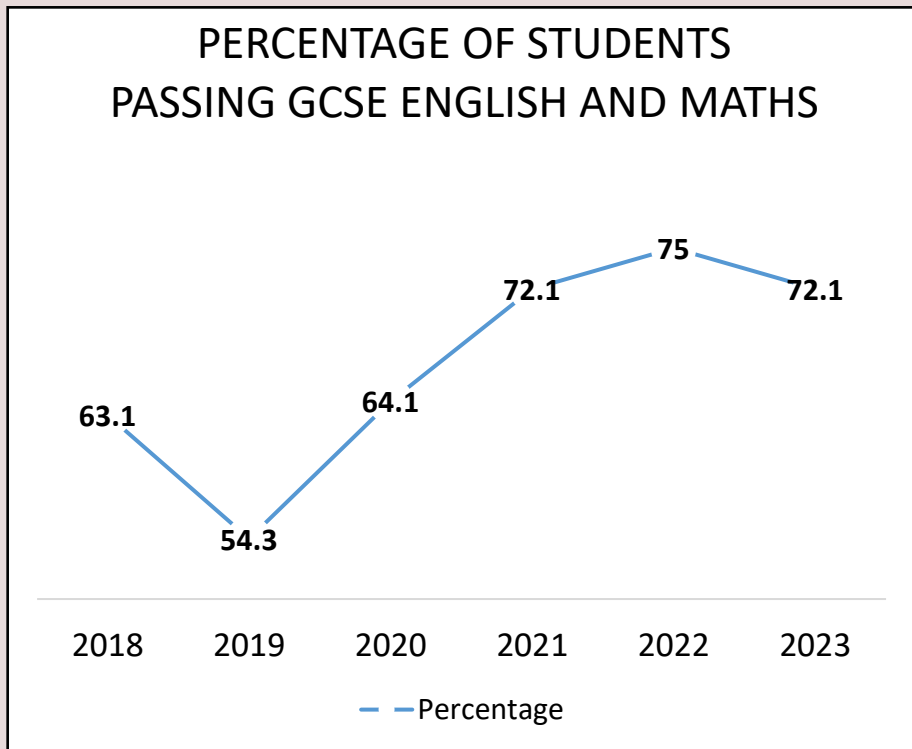

Success at Post 16

- Historically results have been very good.
- No official data for two years (2020 & 2021).
- Adjusted results in 2022: TCOLC performed above the city average.
- 2019 data is the only valid comparison.
- In 2023 all attainment measures show an increase on comparable measures in 2019.

The TCOLC Curriculum

Our Motto “Ambition for All” drives everything we do. One of the first changes was to define what we want from our curriculum and this is where we developed our Curriculum Principles.

1. Relevant Ensuring that what we teach our students is relevant to their lives and context.	2. Rationalised Content A curriculum that is broad yet focused on what is important; one that has clear concepts to be taught and knowledge to be gained. Content needs to be appropriately challenging in its content, texts, concepts, resources.	3. A Sequenced Journey Consideration must be given to where units are placed; how they build on prior learning and how they are sequenced so learning is connected and logical. Students should be included in understanding how their learning journey fits together.
4. Ambitious Learning Ensuring that the curriculum we deliver is challenging and ambitious for all students at all levels, including those students with SEND, EAL, or other groups.	5. Inspiring Our mantra is ‘Ambition for All’. This is about making sure our students enjoy their learning so they are motivated to learn, and in turn are inspired to extend their learning beyond school and be confident that they can positively impact the world around them.	6. Learning that Lasts Forever If students can’t remember what they were taught last lesson, then has it been learnt? It’s important to shift knowledge from the working memory into the long-term memory so students can remember, and build on, what they have been taught.

The TCOLC Curriculum

We also changed how we communicated our expectations to our students through the Performance Pillar of our Character Programme.

Performance Labels explained

- ★ AMBITIOUS** - An independent and critical learner.
- ▲ ACTIVE** - An engaged learner who is eager to improve.
- PASSIVE** - A disengaged learner who needs prompting to improve.
- RESISTANT** - A learner who rejects support and doesn't participate.

What Kind Of Learner Are **YOU?**

Expectations in the Classroom

We create active learning by using:

- A calm entry and exit to the lesson
- A seating plan
- A purposeful pace
- Cold calling
- Probing questions
- Extension activities and questions
- A focus on literacy and oracy
- Asking students to evaluate their own learning and ideas
- Regular feedback with students required to 'up-level'
- Rewards awarded for the demonstration of positive moral, community, performance or intellect characteristics



How Can You Help Your Child Be Even More Successful?

The most successful students at The City of Leicester College (and every school) have many similarities.

Obviously, some students will be better in certain areas than others, but talent will only get a student so far.

Students also need to develop character and have structure, routine and support in their lives.

If we as adults can be consistent in our expectations, then success becomes much more likely.

GCSE English language and English Literature

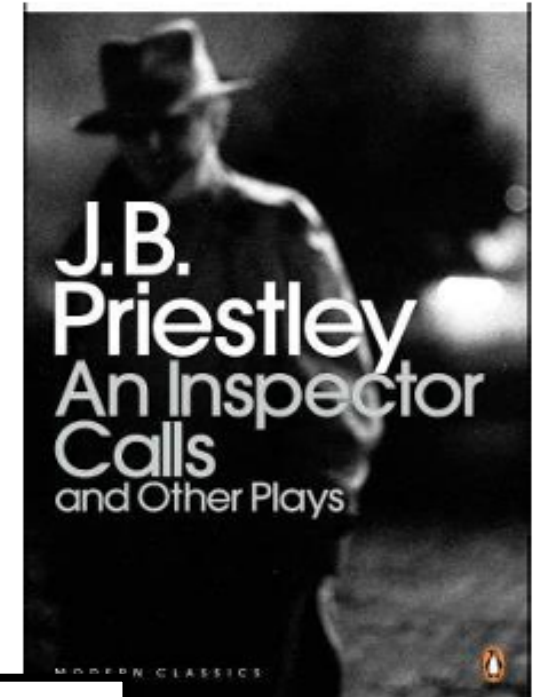

Routines and Foundations of Success

We are very proud of our pastoral offer to all students:

- Clear routines, expectations and sanctions for all our students.
- Rewards and sanctions aligned to our character pillars
- A detailed and coherent Tutor Time Program that runs 30 minutes a day, TCOLC character, numeracy ninjas, literacy, wellbeing
- An extremely effective curriculum in dedicated KS3 and 4 PSHE lessons
- Student leadership opportunities
- Co-curriculum clubs, trips and visits
- A strong culture of safeguarding
- Bespoke behaviour and culture training for all school staff
- Anti-Bullying Ambassadors and the accredited Diana Anti-bullying Award
- A clear mental health strategy that has been held up as an example of best practice designed by highly effective and highly trained staff in school
- The HIVE our student support platform that includes remote access to safeguarding, personal development and health and wellbeing resources
- External audits and verification of our excellent work, e.g Safeguarding, the Rainbow Flag Award, Mental Health

Two key areas of our success:

1. Heads of Year that stay with their year group for five years, this makes a huge difference to how well we know and can support your child.
2. Excellent systems around attendance. We are in the top 10% of schools nationally for attendance



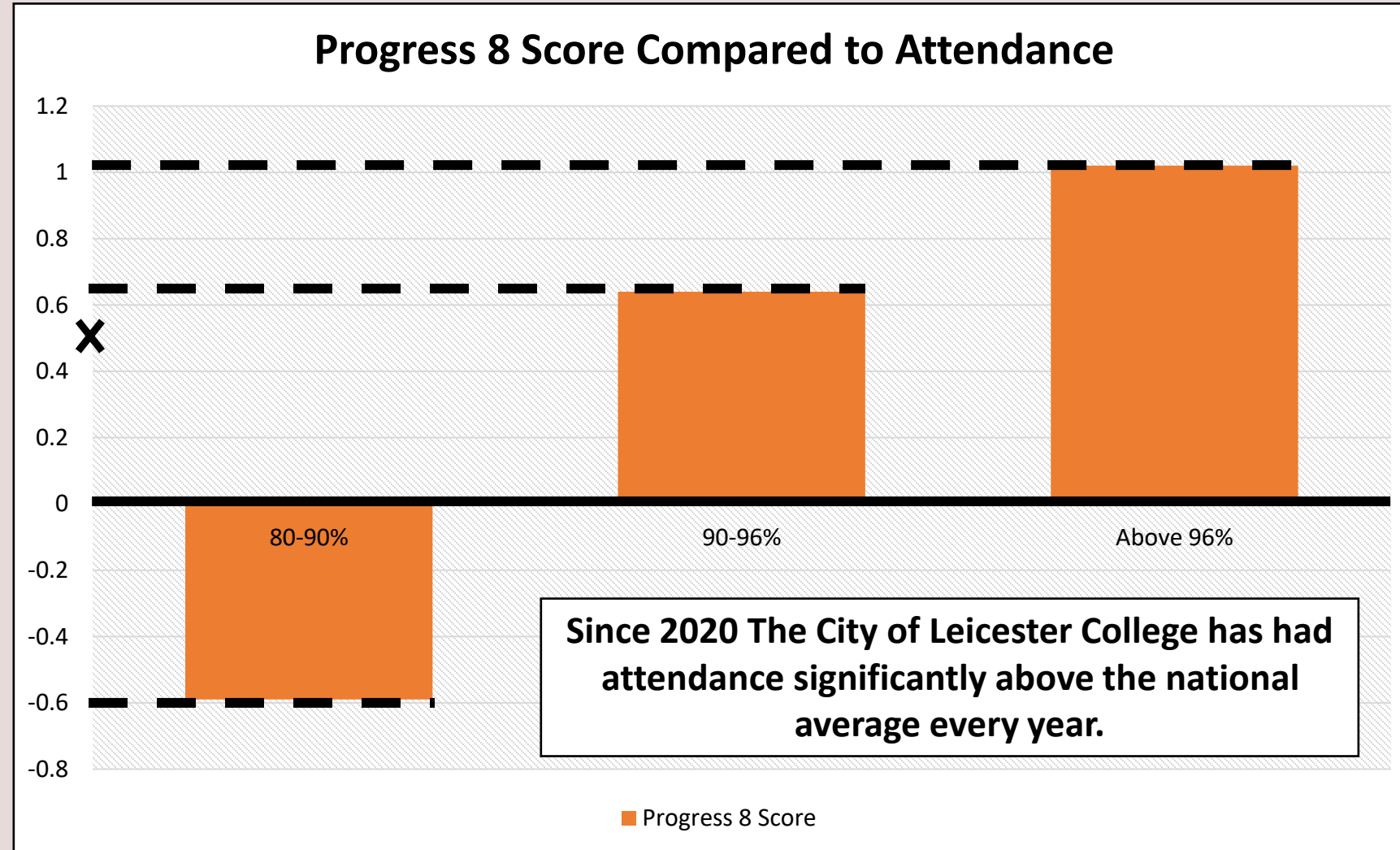
Attendance

In 2022/23 we consistently received awards for remaining in the top 10% of all schools nationally for our attendance

Since 2019 we have put a huge amount of effort into attendance, because it is so critical for success.

We follow up all first day absences and our attendance team, work with all families with low attendance.

In 2022/23 our attendance was over 2% higher than the national average, which in attendance terms is a massive difference!



Pastoral – Inclusion and Support

In a community this size, there will be students who need extra support, and we have a huge and highly effective provision for this also:

- A Full time Deputy DSL, plus all members of CLT and Heads of Year undergo full safeguarding training.
- A large and highly skilled SEND team, including a SENCo and Assistant SENCo
- A mentoring team
- A dedicated attendance team
- A school counsellor employed by the college
- Senior mental health first aider, 8 mental health first aiders and NHS mental health support workers to ensure that our students are well supported
- Key Stage 4 connect centre, onsite alternative curriculum
- Engagement in city wide networks and excellent partnerships with East Leicester, local networks
- A separate and highly skilled EAL team
- Teachers and TAs trained to support our autistic learners and those students with social, emotional and mental health.



What you can do to Help

- Attendance and punctuality is key. A well sequenced curriculum is built to flow and build. The more gaps a student has, the harder they find to access the next parts of the curriculum.
- Support school systems to make sure there are consistent expectations. Full uniform; backing us around sanctions such as corrections; etc.
- Check your child's mobile phone and online usage. Too much, or inappropriate use can negatively affect both social and academic development.
- Ensure there are clear routines at home around bed-times, eating times, etc.
- Communicate with your child's form tutor and HoY any information that may help us to support your child in school
